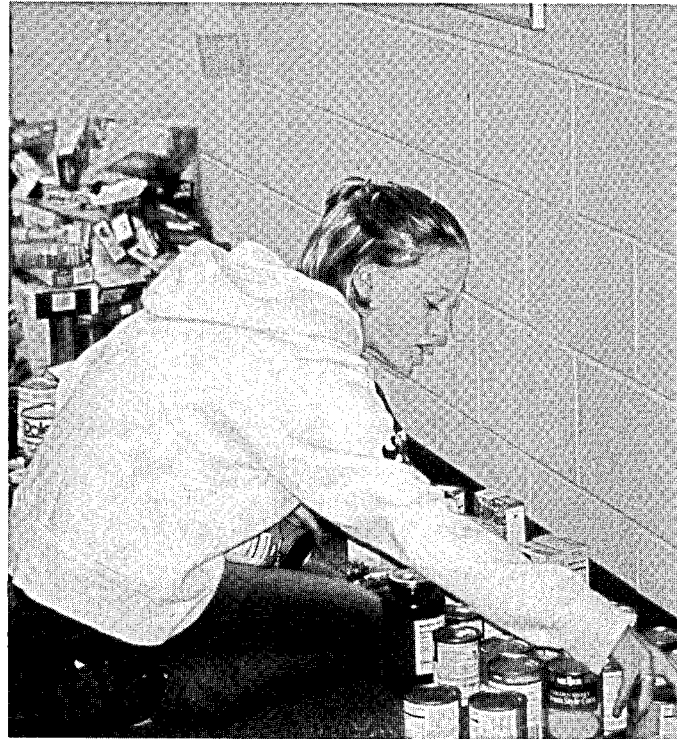

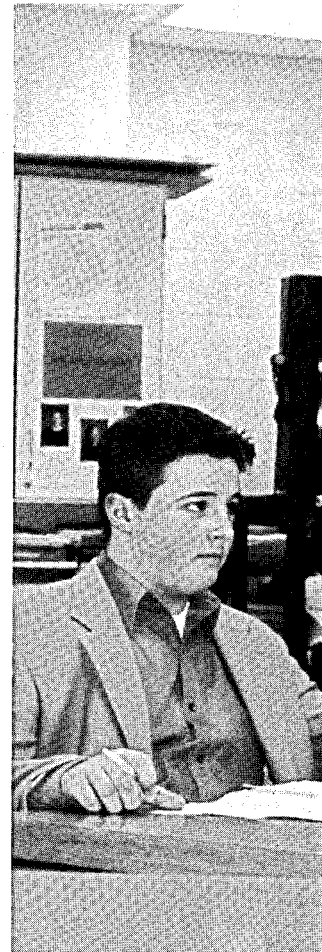

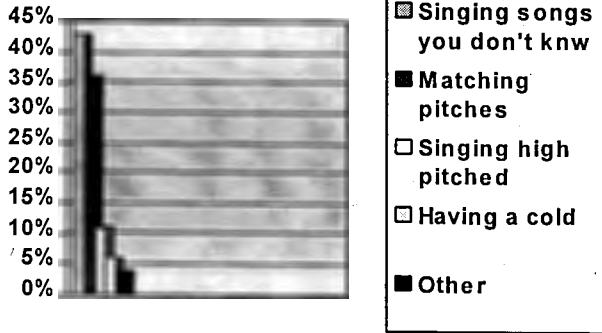

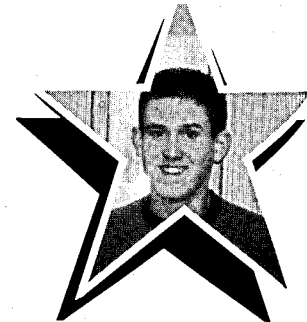

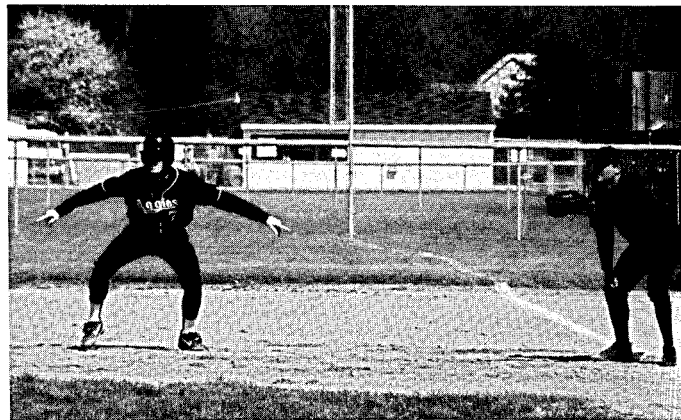
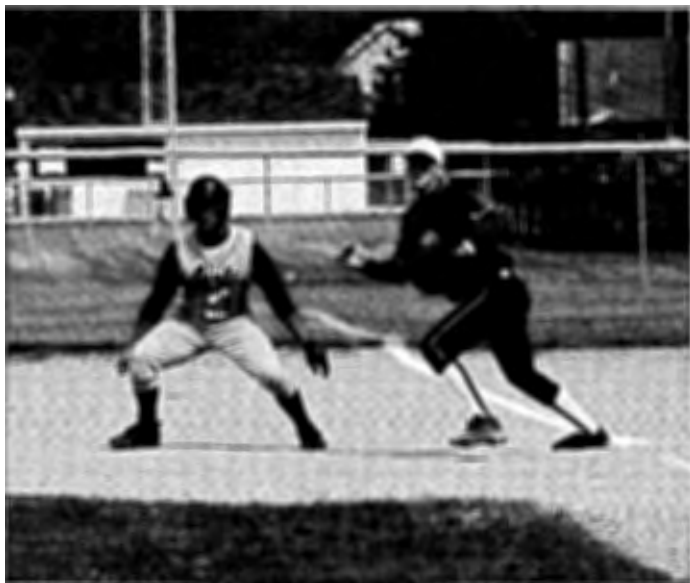

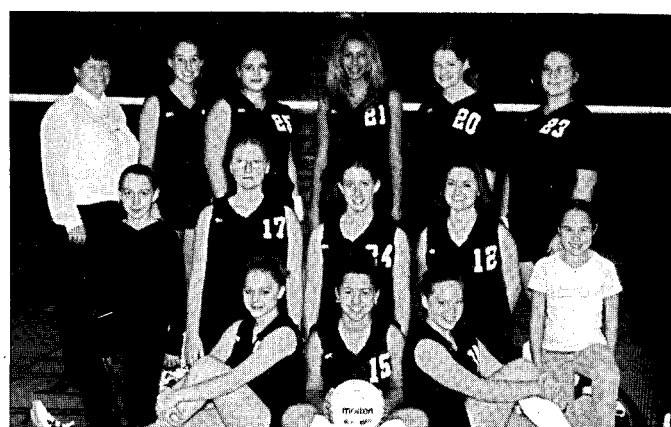

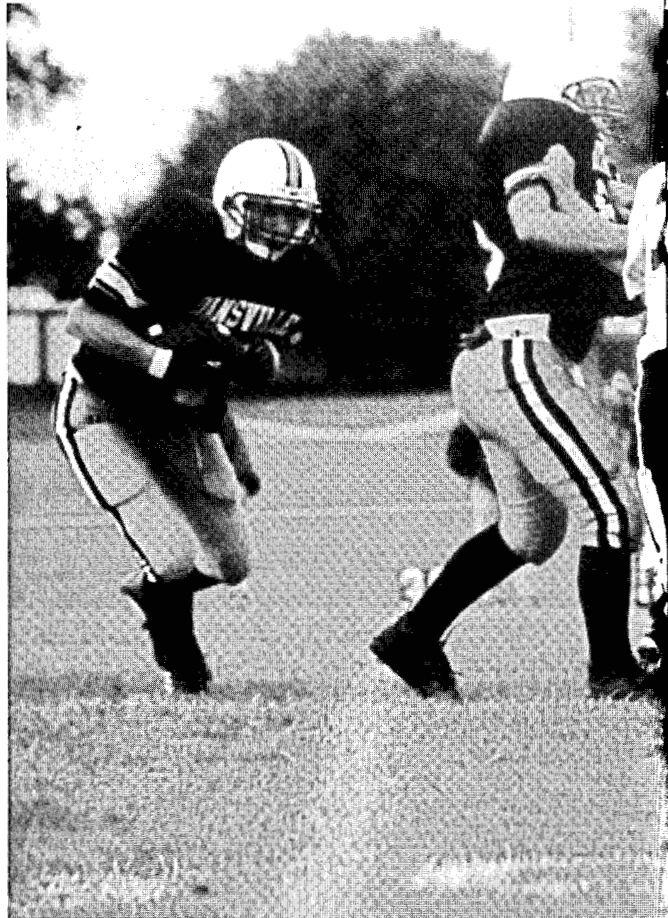

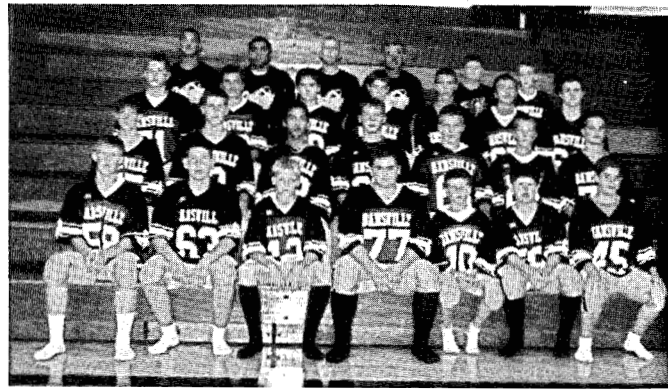

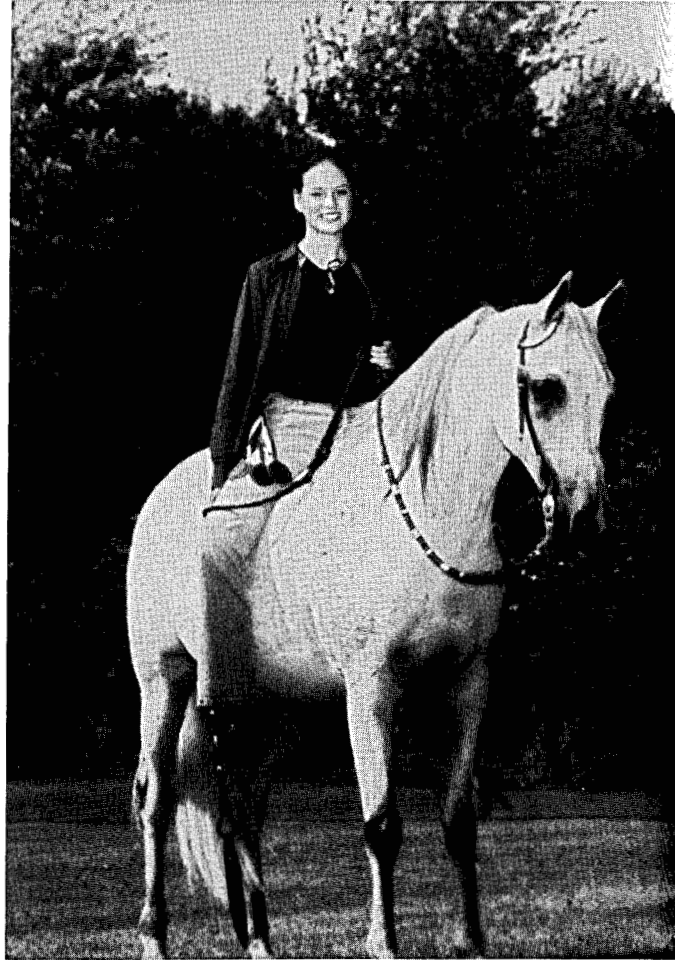

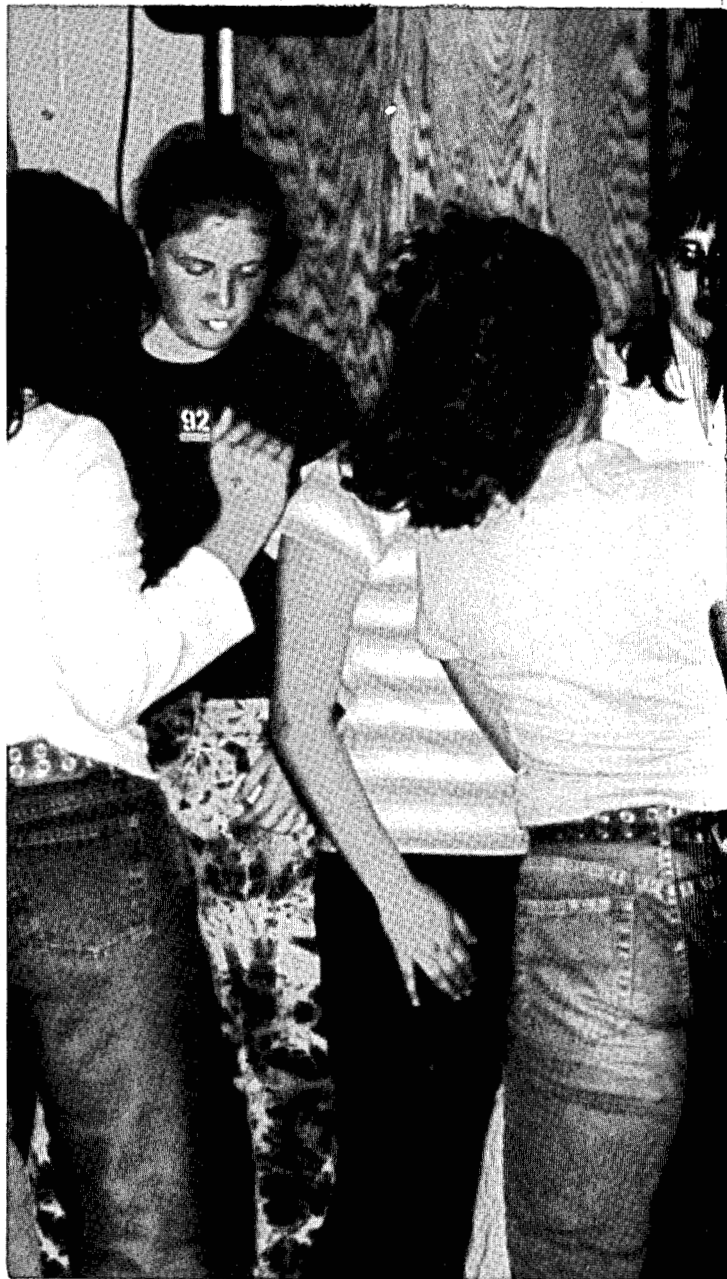
A lot of people like to dance and especially like the DJs because, for the most part, they're our age and play the music young people like to listen to. What people like most about

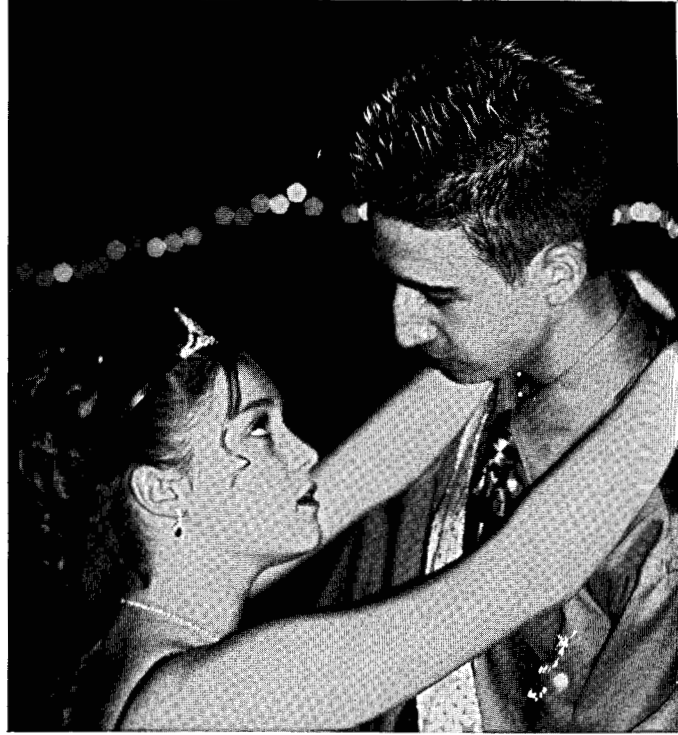

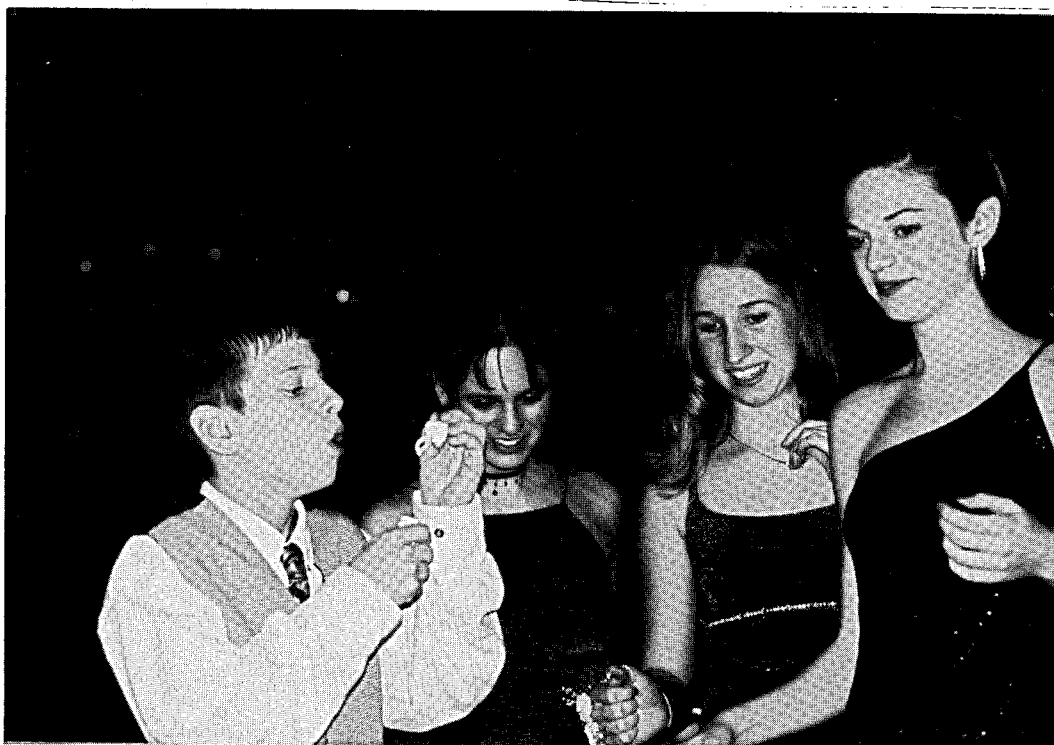

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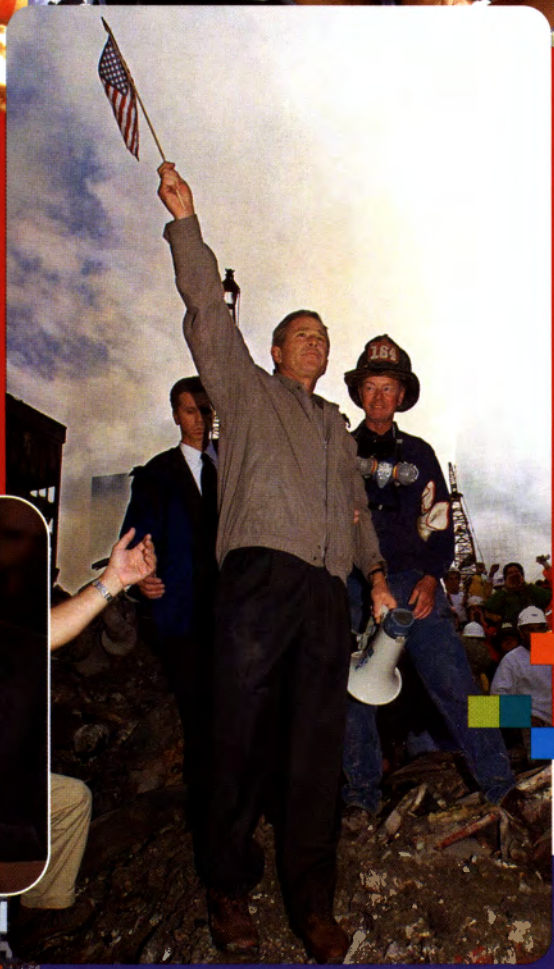

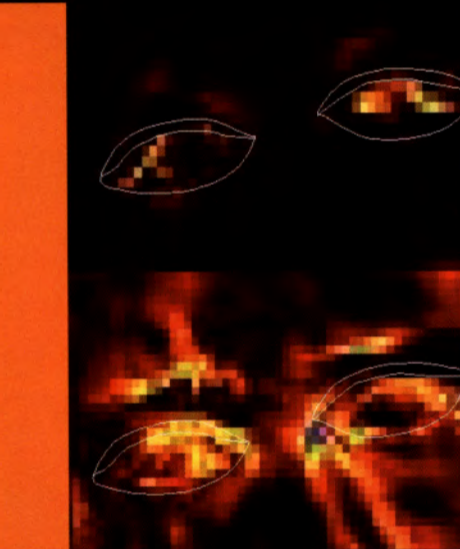

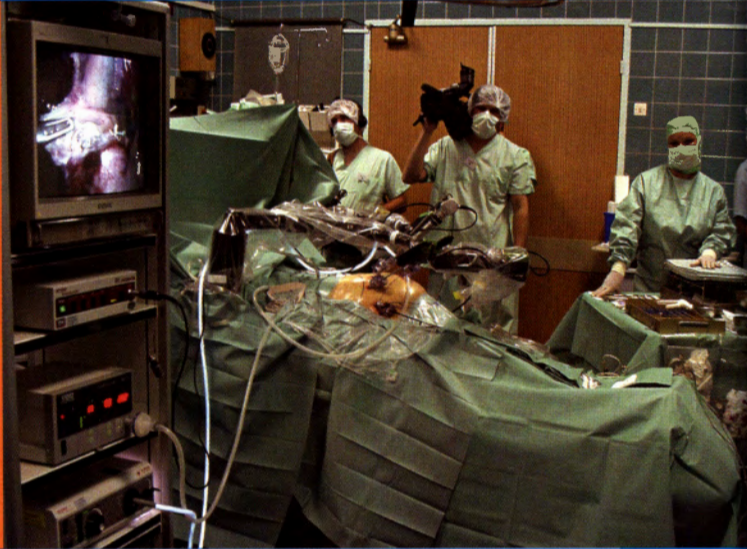

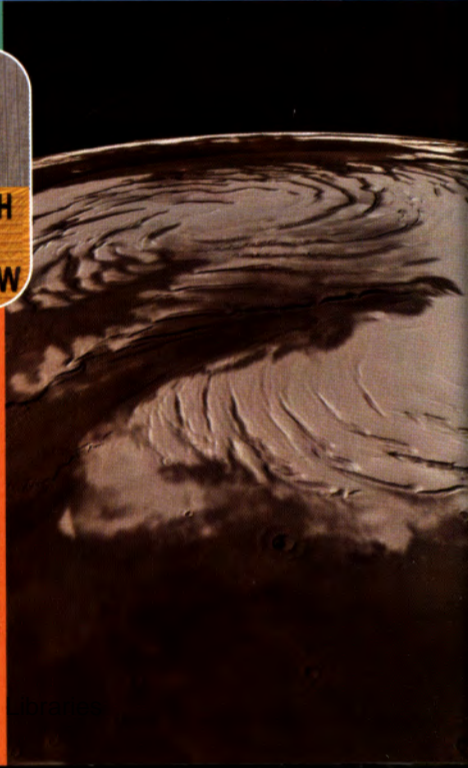

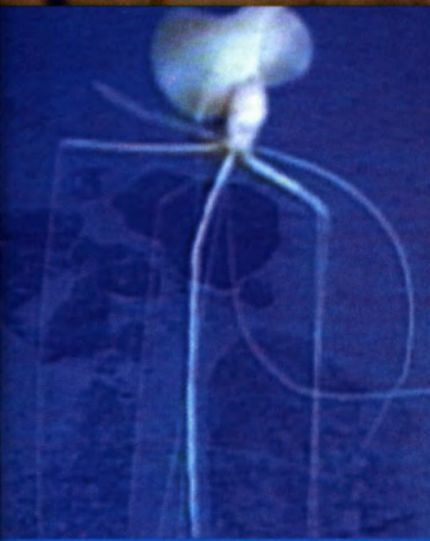

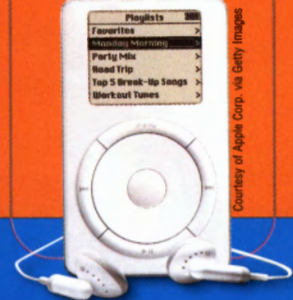

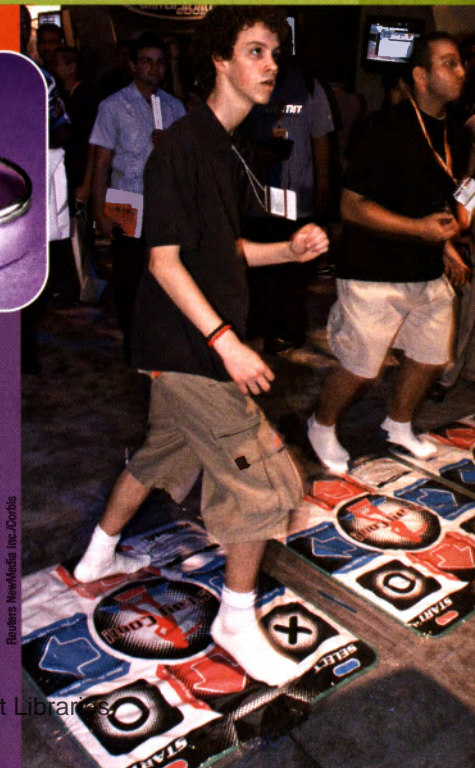

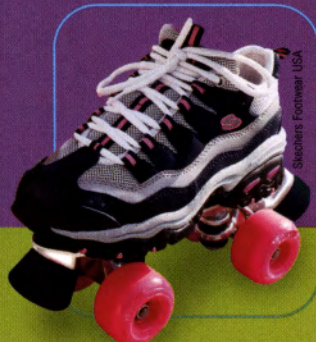

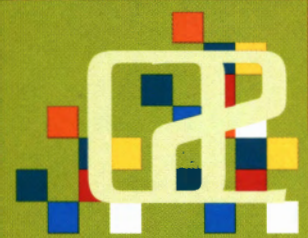

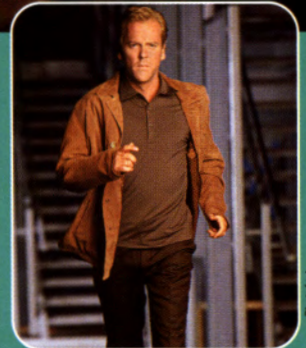

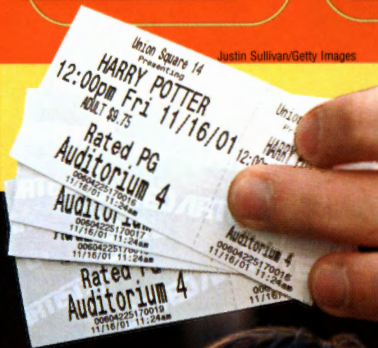

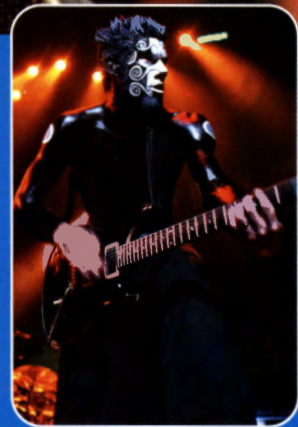

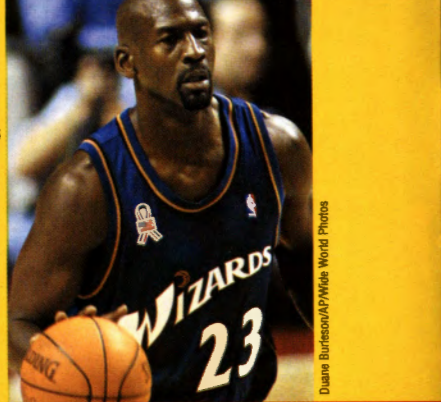

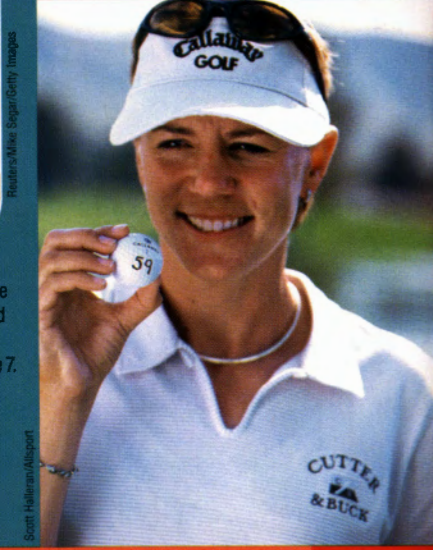

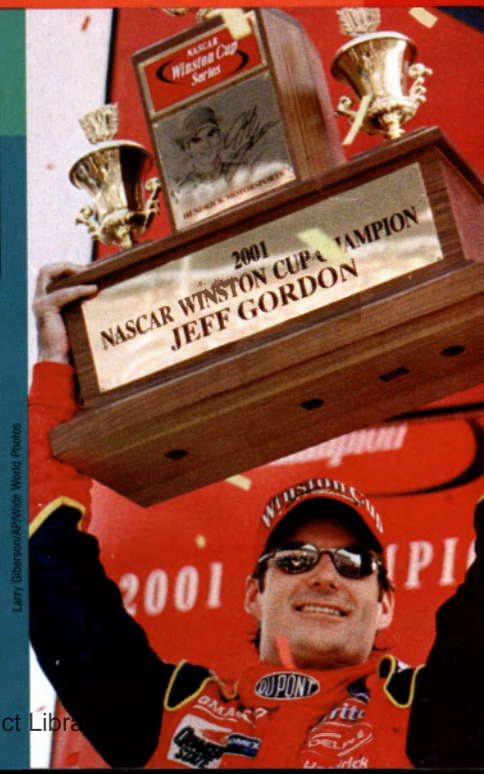

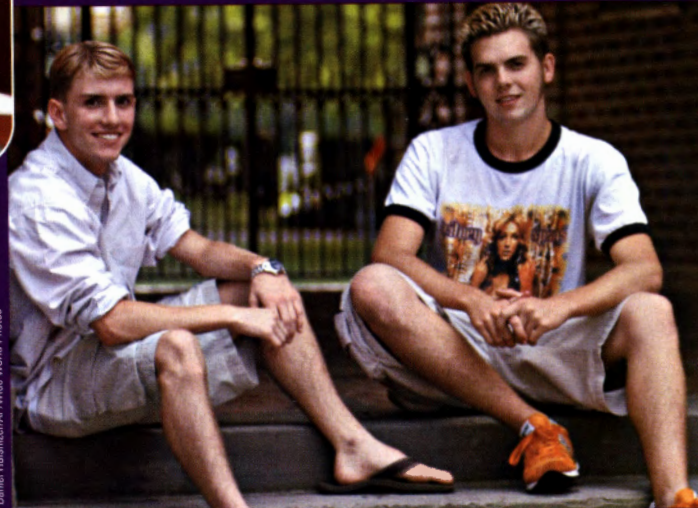
