Dakin began carrying mail during World War I. He started work September 1, 1918. There were then seven rural routes out of Mason. The horse and buggy days were drawing to a close, though, and within a few years as both automobiles and roads were improved the routes were lengthened. When carriers died or retired they were not replaced. In 1918 horses were used during the winter months but automobiles were used the rest of the year. By 1923 the carriers relied upon their automobiles entirely.

# Highway Program Is Dependent On **Extra Revenues**

Townships May Be Asked To Match Highway Funds For New Construction

Members of the road and bridge committee of the board of supervisors are in apparent agreement with the members of the road commission that extra revenue will have to be provided for any 1948 construction program. There are two sources in sight. One is the extra cash being paid to townships under the sales tax diversion amendment. The other is a levy on general property.

Now the entire construction and maintenance program in Ingham is financed by Ingham's share of gasoline and weight taxes. Those taxes are not in danger of being cut, but they don't buy as much labor, oil, gasoline, gravel, cement or equipment as they did before inflation struck.

Supervisors and commissioners who made the grand tour of the county Monday and Tuesday with Highway Engineer Frank Evans were convinced more costly maintenance and new construction are needed.



# Conservation Pays Big Cash Dividends

### Save the Soil Methods At Purdue Prove Ideal

A soil conservation system combining the teamwork of large amounts of fertilizer, contour farming, manure and



corn, wheat and hay, according to Glenn Bedell, Such a system proved its benefits at the Purdue station. The test was conducted in 12 small fields from 1942 through 1945. All the fields had three-year retations: corn, wheat and meadow. Six

fit of extra fertilizer, contour cropping, manure, lime and deep rooted legumes, the water loss from runoff for four years was eight inches, compared with 171/2 on fields farmed under the common system. Soil loss was only 1.8 tons under conservation against 8.8 tons with the common system. Organic matter losses were 492 and 976 pounds, respectively, while those of nitrogen were 16 and 77 pounds; phosphorus 19 and 62; and potash, 10 and 24 pounds. Corn yields averaged 92 bushels per acre against 62 bushels on the common fields, in 1942. By 1945 the corn output reached 122 bushels per acre, compared with 71 bushels on the common fields. Wheat yields averaged 25 bushels and 15 bushels.

# MASTERPIECE FURNITURE

There is more than meets the eye in furniture. Be careful not to buy what looks good, but has construction faults.

Furniture is only as strong as its weakest joint. To help you evaluate what you buy here are things to look for:

Unless the wood that goes into a piece of furniture is properly seasoned, it may, with changing humidity, disassemble itself into a comedy of warped boards.

Ask to see the dovetailed joints in the drawers. These, like wedges, cleave together tightly when pull is exerted. Ask to see the tongue and groove joints in the bottom of the drawers, in the sides of chests.

Insist on top rails being dowel jointed, on side rails being grooved and mortised, on sturdy bearers on plywood drawer bottoms, dust panels, back panels. See that the drawer guides are screwed in place.

Hidden values count for much in furniture. The seasoning of the wood, for example, is something the naked eye can't see. To be sure, look for Morgan, whose reputation stands behind your purchase.

# Health

While there is no danger of an epidemic, reports of recent creases in the number of Scarlet Fever cases have caused doctors of medicine again to advise parents to have their children protected from the disease.

Scarlet Fever is sometime's severe and sometimes mild; in either case it is contagious and may be spread by discharge from the nose and throat of an infected person or by Scarlet Fever carriers. The disease also can be spread by milk. which has been contaminated by persons with Scarlet Fever.

According to the Michigan bur-eau of disease control, there have been 3,550 cases of Scarlet Fever troit. so far this year. State regulations require that every case of the were disease be reported to health au day. thorities to prevent serious outbreaks in a community.

The doctor of medicine can detained his inherited protection against the disease by giving him the Dick test. If the spot where the Dick test is made turns red, the test indicates the child is at least susceptible to Scarlet Fever If the skin remains a normal col-

or, the test is negative.
. If the test is positive and the child has recently been exposed to Scarlet Fever, the doctor may advise Eights Scarlet Figury anti-tosh, for temporary protection. The child may be protected transist future exposure, with injections of Scarlet Fever toxin, which usually protect a person against the disease for several years.

The first symptoms of the dis ease appear within a week after exposure and include nausea, fever and sore throat followed by a rash on the second or third day. A doctor of medicine should be called at once if a person is suspected of having the disease. He will know how to treat it and prevent the serious complications that set in, including heart, kidney or eur disorders.





# Forester Predicts Wildlife Famine

Michigan can expect a gradual and continual decrease in most types of wildlife, according to Paul A. Herbert, head of the forestry department at Michigan

Forty years ago foresters were predicting a timber famine, Herbert points out. The years have proved those predictions correct. Today we can predict a wildlife famine with equal confidence, he believes.

Most of the larger forms of wildlife of major interest to the tourist and hunter require cover and food of a kind that is rapidly disappearing in Michigan. Without such protective cover and food it is inevitable that a large part of the wildlife will starve or be des-

According to Herbert, clean farming and the increase in dairy farming reduce both food and cover of farm game animals and birds. On the non-agricultural areas which are growing up into dense forests the same reduction can be predicted because the species of trees that grow over most of Michigan do not produce much food for wildlife. The dense tree stands, as they grow older, shade out most of the plants that furnish both food and shelter to most kinds of forest wildlife.

A wildlife famine cannot be entirely avoided but it could be made much less severe if all persons connected with wildlife came to a realistic grip with the problem. Herbert believes this is unlikely and says, "My prediction of a wildlife famine within 40 years







Then came the theory that public affairs should be shunned as something indecent or unclean. Civil service rules were passed to keep men and women trained in government from participating in the machinery of government. We began to question the right of preachers and teachers to attend political conventions, and if they did go they were expected to remain silent. It is little wonder that political leadership went to Rev. 

Dven small farms (averaging 86 that were well operated paid an average annual labor income of \$1,560. This shows the value of efficient operation.



### Extra Care Given To Fall Pigs Pays

The present prospect for a short corn crop this fall is causing many hogs to go to market when they otherwise might be fed longer or kept over for breeding stock. H. W. Newland, Michigan State college animal husbandry specialist, points give fall pigs some extra care.

Equipment and housing used for spring farrowing are sometimes Hidden Lake. inadequate for unpredictable fall weather. If the weather is chilly and the sow is quiet at farrowing time, the farmer may want to remove the pigs to a warm place for a time. If the sow's milk has begun to flow, the pigs should be alowed to nurse every two hours.

About the time fall pigs are old enough to wean, the weather may be guite severe. It is important that pigs have warm, comfortable housing after being weaned and also at castration and vaccination

For fall pigs to do well, Newland advises, it should be planned so the pigs will come early enough to get out on some good clean pasture for a few weeks before winter sets in. Little-pig anemia is always a danger if the pigs are confined to cement or wooden floors and are receiving only their mother's milk. The pigs having this common ailment have very pale skin lack rigor and have a rough hair coat. This trouble is due to a lack of iron and copper in the little pigs'

If it is necessary that the pigs be left inside for more than three or four days, they should receive the lacking minerals. The easiest way to supply the minerals is to swab or spray the sow's udder daily with a solution of one-half pound of copperas (ferrous sulphate, in one quart of water.

Since that time the college has devoted its efforts to rehabilitation of the property, which had become somewhat run down during the war years because of shortage of labor.

On many days this summer more than 200 cars visited the project, which is located west of Tipton on M-50. 





to have one. The law makes it unlawful for anyone to "hinder or prevent by mass picketing, threats, intimidation, force or coercion of any kind the pursuit of any law-ful work or employment." That's a mouthful.

Also: The law-makes it unlawful for anyone to "obstruct or interfere with free and uninterrupted use of public roads, streets, high-ways, airports or other ways of travel or conveyance."

Enforcement of the law is up to all enforcement agencies in the following order City police, county sheriff's department, Michigan state police, Michigan National Guard and United States army. State police or the National Guard intervene only by order of the governor upon receipt of an appeal from a mayor or sheriff. The U. S. army intervenes only upon order of the president upon receipt

of an appeal from the governor. The new law is the result of a public's protest against industrial strikes that affect the general public welfare.


