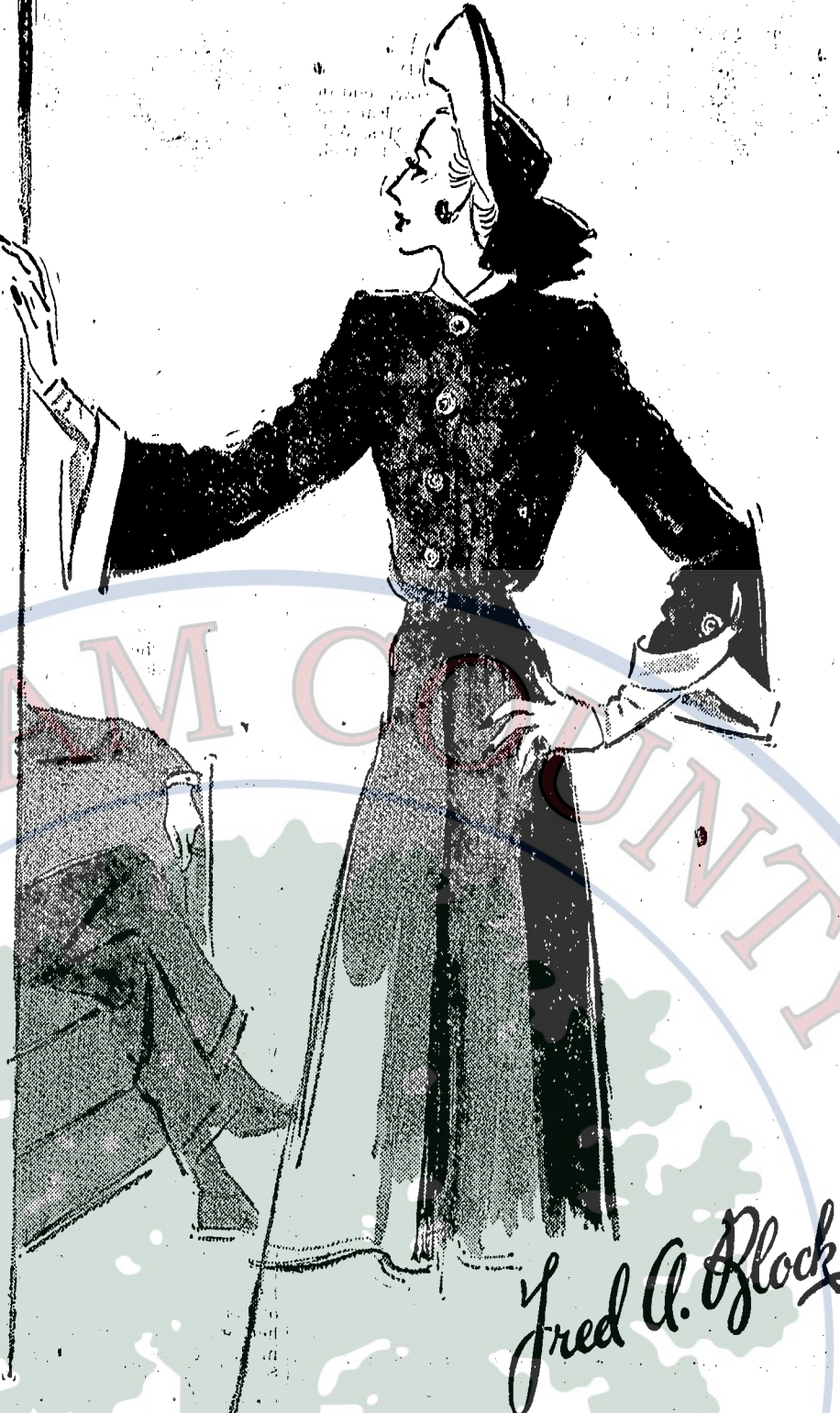

**Scarlet Fever Threat**

While there is no danger of an epidemic, reports of recent increases in the number of Scarlet Fever cases have caused doctors of medicine again to advise parents to have their children protected from the disease.

Scarlet Fever is sometimes severe and sometimes mild; in either case it is contagious and may be spread by discharge from the nose and throat of an infected person or by Scarlet Fever carriers. The disease also can be spread by milk, which has been contaminated by persons with Scarlet Fever.

According to the Michigan bureau of disease control, there have been 3,500 cases of Scarlet Fever so far this year. State regulations require that every case of the disease be reported to health authorities to prevent serious outbreaks in a community.

The doctor of medicine can detect whether your child has retained his inherited protection against the disease by giving him the Dick test. If the spot where the test indicates the child is, at least susceptible to Scarlet Fever, the skin remains a normal color, or the test is negative.

If the test is positive and the child has recently been exposed to Scarlet Fever, the doctor may advise giving the child a protective dose of a substance called the Dick toxin, which usually protects a person against the disease for several years.

The first symptoms of the disease appear within a week after exposure and include nausea, fever and sore throat followed by a rash on the second or third day. A doctor of medicine should be called at once if a person is suspected of having the disease. He will know how to treat it and prevent the serious complications that often set in, including heart, kidney or ear disorders.
