Achievement day marks the opening of national home demonstration week in Ingham county. The week, based on the theme, "Today's Home Builds Tomorrow's World," will end May 3. Home demonstration work is part of the cooperative extension service sponsored jointly by the United States department of agriculture, Michigan State college, Ingham county, and local organizations.

In Michigan 40,000 women belong to home demonstration groups. The county program is framed by local members who select topics to fit their needs and wishes. Mrs. Annette Schaeffer of Mason is the Ingham county home demonstration agent.

Mrs. Delmar Carr, county chairman, introduced the speakers of the day. Mrs. Lawrence Dolbee had charge of achievement day arrangements. Others

who worked with her were Mrs. Carr, Mrs. Gerald Diamond, Mrs. Hugh Ellsworth, Mrs. Harold Glynn, and the new executive committee members, Mrs. Morell Fox, Mrs. Harold Redman, Mrs. Howard Pollok, Mrs. Roy Hills, Mrs. Jerald Topliff, Mrs. Alvin Goble and Mrs. Lawton Gauss.

Each club leader received a rose corsage and every member present was given a gladiolus bulb as a favor. Baskets of flowers decorated the hall for the event.

Exhibits of the 25 years of extension work were placed around the hall including a scrapbook of materials used throughout that time. There was also a General Electric fluorescent lighting exhibit which tied in with the project on lighting given as an extension lesson the past year.

To start off the morning's program, members of the Aurelius Center extension group, put on a play, "Mushrooms Coming Up," directed by Mrs. John Edgar.

Mrs. W. B. Ketchum gave the invocation and Mrs. Fred Miller gave the extension creed. Mrs. Lawrence Dolbee read over minutes of the 1951 achievement day and the treasurer's report

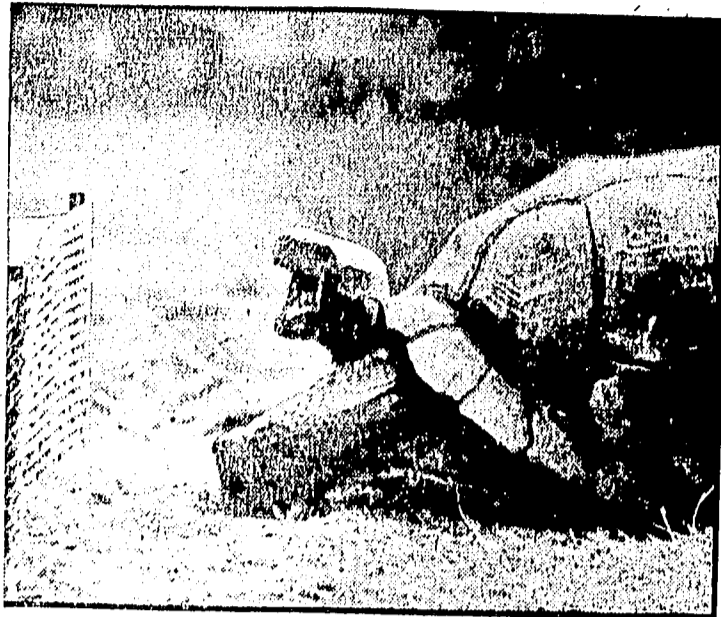

Liquid Gas Use Shows Increase

Continuing its spectacular advances of recent years, the liquefied petroleum gas industry registered an estimated 25.9% sales increase in 1951. F. C. Anderson of F. C. Anderson & Sons, local Shellene LP-Gas jobber, said.

Approximately 4,100,000,000 gallons of the fuel, also known as butane, propane, bottled and tank gas, were marketed nationally, compared with 3,254,082,000 in 1950. This is exclusive of the amounts that went into production of aviation and motor gasoline and synthetic rubber.

Quoting figures from an industry survey, Anderson asserted that well over two-thirds of the 1951 total was used for household, farm and direct motor fuel applications. The remainder was consumed for industrial, chemical manufacturing and miscellaneous purposes.

Approximately 260,000 of the automatic gas heaters turned out last year were designed for LP-Gas operation, and substantial percentages of the gas heating equipment, refrigerators, clothes dryers and incinerators also went into the LP-gas market.

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

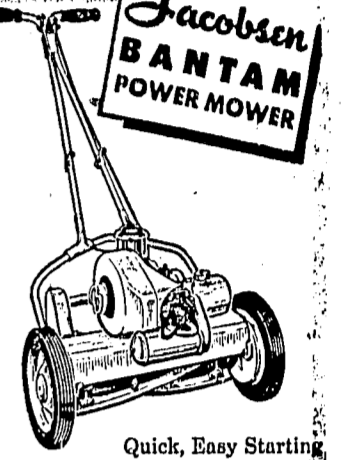
