#### **Business Management Required**

Michigan State university and the University of Michigan both have outstanding departments of business administration. They should prove their usefulness during this year and next when the people, through their elected representatives, are unable to provide all the money the univer-

At both Ann Arbor and East Lansing there are professors of psychology. They should recognize the need for a calm, logical, sound acceptance of the situation in which the universities find themselves.

The legislature provided an appropriation of \$87,761,741 for higher education in Michigan. It provided \$25,315,000 for Michigan State and \$30,000,000 for the University of Michigan. That's about a million dollars less in each case than the current appropriation.

Both universities are big institutions—among the biggest in the world. So are their budgets. Surely the administrators at both institutions are resourceful enough to fit their programs to the new budgets. They can find less essential services which can be curtailed or shelved and no one will suffer much. They can raise tuition rates which are now far below cost and far below rates charged by nonstate colleges.

Both Dr. John Hannah at Michigan State and Dr. Harlan Hatcher at the University of Michigan will bring their institutions through the financial crisis without any great

They must realize that the legislature did not withhold the extra money out of penuriousness. The money just wasn't there. In fact, all the money appropriated just isn't there. The people in Michigan have so far been unable to keep even with the demands made upon them for taxation in multitudinous forms. There are many family budgets, which are suffering far worse comparatively than MSU and

The legislators who withstood the pressures of the university lobbies are to be commended. Some have asserted that such great pressure has never before been applied in

Had the legislature yielded to the university demands to scrap the appropriation bill and give the sums the universities demanded, representative and responsible government in Michigan might have sustained a mortal blow. Legislators, had they yielded to the pressures, could have been called errand boys for the state board of agriculture and the board of regents.

Michigan State university and the University of Michigan will shape their programs to the money available, the people can be assured. Good business management will prevent any financial disaster at East Lansing and Ann Arbor. Both universities may be the stronger for practicing forced economy.

#### Parks Take Preserving

Many people were cheered last week by the action of the supervisors in favoring the purchase of land for a park in Delhi township. The county was offered 23 acres with frontage on Grand river. The supervisors accepted the offer, and if the title is clear, which it probably is, another park will be added to Ingham's system.

That 23 acres is the first purchase of county park land many years. There was a small parcel added to Lake Lansing park a year ago, but no purchase of sizable acreage has been made. Thousands of acres of Ingham land have been bought for residential development and for speculation. With people flocking into the county the need for park expansion has steadily grown. But up until last week we have done nothing about it.

We should be on the lookout now for other suitable areas for park development. Our park expansion should keep pace with the population growth.

Then, too, the road commission, which in Ingham serves as the park commission, should develop some rigid controls. Park commissioners are the trustees of all land dedicated to park purposes. They have the responsibility of maintaining the parks, of protecting them against despoilation. They have no right to delegate that power or authority.

For instance, the park commissioners should not give either written or oral permission for any other county board or any school to convert park timber into lumber for buildings or gates or lumber for other purposes.

Thirty years ago people in Ingham county bought what was then known as Hilliard's woods, now Rayner park, to save the stand of timber, to preserve it. They didn't buy it as a farm woodlot or a source of lumber for doors and gates and other needs at the county fairgrounds. They didn't buy it for shop lumber or experimental purposes by any school. People bought the woods to look at the trees, to walk through them, to get pleasure out of a perpetual forest. They'd still rather see big trees in Rayner park than to look at a new sheep barn, or fence or gates.

The park commissioners halted the logging last week when it was brought to their attention that many of the big trees had been cut and that a sawmill was being moved in. It was too late then, of course. Some of the best trees in the park are now being sawed into rough lumber. It will take 100 years to grow others to the same size as those cut. The park commissioners said they understood that only diseased or dead trees were to be removed. That wasn't the understanding of the fair board, or the deputy sheriff who had charge of jail prisoners doing the cutting.

Park commissioners have a responsibility to preserve parks, and the trees in them, which can not be delegated to other agencies, or boards or individuals. Park commissioners are trustees for all the people of this county. Their responsibility is not to furnish sawlogs and slabwood, or lumber for county fair pens or barns. The county park is not a farm woodlot.

The park commissioners are trustees for all lands bought for park purposes. They are trustees for the preservation of the parks — and that includes the trees.

Some of the biggest and best trees in Rayner woods are now gone. Their loss should serve to bring home to the park commissioners their responsibility — and the perils of neglecting it.

#### Cause and Effect

In a talk before the Lansing Rotary club last Friday, Ralph W. Daniels was reported as saying, "Lansing has looked at the alcoholic problem with the courage of an ostrich." He also declared that Lansing has 6,000 alcoholics.

Daniels is executive director of the state board of alcoholism, a board set up to study and educate - just what to study and who to educate being somewhat vague.

Daniels spoke out against the liquor interests, the dries and the alcoholics. He charged Lansing and its institutions





Commercial gardeners can profit from the idea, too. Growers who follow production practices to get top yields and who have developed premium markets for early produce will get the most benefit from the mulch, the horticulturist says.





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# Milk Production Continues to Jump But Cash Return to Farmer Drops

By CARL COLLIN

A record volume of milk will be produced this year but farm farm products each year. ers will receive a smaller cash return for it than they did last

USDA economists say the milk receipts from the sale of this

Per capita consumption of dairy products fell 2% last year. Secretary Benson says the lower support prices this year should result in lower retail prices which in turn should boost consumption.

The government bought the equivalent of 6.8 billion lb of milk for the marketing year ended March 31, to prop dairy prices. Government economists expect purchases this year will run below the 1957 volume.

Last year the per capita consumption of margarine surpassed that of butter for the first time. USDA reports that butter consumption averaged 8.5 lb, margarine 8.6 lb. The butter average n 1956 was 8.7 compared with 8.2 for margarine. This represents a sharp change in the usage pattern of these 2 products since 1935, when the per capita use of cial corn area. butter was 17.6 lb compared with 3 lb for margarine, USDA officials expect the difference will widen more this year with margarine making further gains.


