






Holt High School is traditionally in love with music and 1983 was no exception!






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Election 1982:







"The success does not come from winning or losing. The success comes from the effort. A participant who pushes himself to the limit or perhaps even exceeds his limit is someone who should be respected.








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
"FAN" TASTIC

Senior Todd Long defined the "true" sports fan as, "someone who still cheers, even if the team is losing."
















UNSEEN EFFORT



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
ONE FUN WEEK








SHOW TIME


DEDICATION



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




HOLT HOOPERS



The Boys' Varsity Golf Team improved greatly from last year bringing their record up from I-II to 4-8 this year.














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GET TOUGH RAM PRIDE SHOWS







LETS CHEER GIVE ME AN H-O-L-T












MOMENTS SPENT OUT-OF-CLASS

Many students competed to create the most interesting beker. The decorations included such






INTERNATIONAL FRIENDS

Imagine walking through a crowd of people that are totally different and unfamiliar. Imagine feeling all alone, friends far away. Imagine going to school with a strange sounding name. This happened to two students in Holt High School.

A young man, Anssi Korhoren, and a young woman, Lone Jensen, came to Holt from Helsinki, Finland and Bjayrson, Denmark. This was how they felt their first day at HHS.

In the fall Anssi Korhoren tried out for Cross Country saying "I never ran for a sport. Mostly I tried out to meet new people and make friends." Anssi enjoyed the sport and he met new people and made friends. As most foreigners, Anssi loved McDonalds. His favorite teacher was Mr. Bill York. Anssi, 17, was a senior here at Holt, but when he returns to Finland he will still have two more years of schooling.

Seventeen year old Lone Jensen also attended classes everyday at Holt. Lone thought the students were friendly and considerate. She enjoyed listening to the radio and watching television. American type football was new and American schools were much easier. At home in Denmark she has completed high school. Lone Jensen plans on furthering her education in some sort of private school or college.







SCHOOL IN THE ELSA-BRANDSHION-GYMNASIUM was completely different from school in Holt, according to the responds of the German girls. When asked to compare, many said school in Holt was much easier than school in Germany. In Germany, the students can not choose their classes, taking about 13 required subjects every year. Each student stayed in the same class until the lith grade. Each class remained in its own room and the teachers moved from one room to the other. The relation between teacher and student was more strict — not as easy going as Holt. They also added that Holt had more athletic activities and musical activities than they had in Elsa-Brandshiom. GERMAN GIRLS

Elue Sohlbrand, Sybille Rommelt, Uruse Sigrid — students from Holt? No, they were three of the I3 exchange students from the Elsa-Brandshiom-Gymnasium in Germany. 1983 was the tenth-year anniversary for the Munich-Holt exchange.

The German exchange students arrived in Lansing on March 25, 1983 and left on April 15, 1983. The three weeks they were here were packed with educational trips and assemblies. A trip to Greenfield Village, a tour of the Capital Area Career Center, a trip to the Warton Center to see the musical Peter Pan, a tour of the Michigan Museum and a visit to the State Capital were a part of their agenda. Many host families took the German students on family trips during spring break to Florida, Niagara Falls, Lake Michigan, Canada and Washington.

Arriving in Holt as complete strangers, they formed bonds of friendship, trust and respect. When asked what they liked best about their stay in Holt, they said they liked the friendly people, their host families and the trips they took. When the time came for the German girls to leave, tears had to be held back. The girls that came as total strangers, left as friends not to be forgotten by the families that hosted them. During the summer of '83 Holt students had the opportunity to visit Germany making new frien'ds, or perhaps greeting old ones.



CAREER VIEWS PRACTICAL TRAINING



All Board members have a keen sense of community service and strive to perform in the best interest of their constituents. — by Dr. Foy


IT WASN'T EASY








OUTRAGEOUS






OUTGOING


MOONLIGHT PARADISE

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ALMOST OVER




BACCALAUREATE








public with the company and to support the Holt Public Schools."
