

All in all, the trip was filled with memories and friends that will last a lifetime.



"Senior year is the last year you have to spend with the friends you've grown up with, don't waste it," said Rachelle Rousse.


Melvin Tsai advised, "Never procrastinate - it's the root of all failure in school. It's ironic that this simple rule is also the hardest to follow."

High school has also brought these freshmen new opportunities. "The best thing this year so far has been being on the soccer team," said Ryan Pendergast.







win, and there are only 300 in the entire nation!



The long hours of practice paid off for the orchestra. They produced magical music and shone like the stars that they are.












These two occurrences do not defy the norm. Okemos High School has a rich tradition of winning sports teams whose classiness and respect for the game take them to the next level. This year was no exception.






But why would someone want to play waterpolo? What drives them to strap on those




RAGAINST TIME




This team remained positive about all the difficulties that arose. "Even though our record was not impressive, we stuck together and worked diligently every day



After it is all over, even wrestlers can look back and appreciate the experience.


"I would like to thank Coach Wilcox and Coach Whitford, along with all the practice partners that kicked my butt," freshman Mark Fulger said.





Whatever the interest, OHS has a club for everyone. And if they don't? Form your own. There's always room for more. by Justin Perrone







"For some strange reason, a majority of the works we have read have contained classical themes," stated Literary Club president, senior **Jean Wong.**




In May they put on a carnival for elementary students with the intent of not only giving the kids a fun activity, but also involving many of the high school students in the process. The purpose of Key Club activities


is simple: to bridge the generation gap and get people working together for a common cause.




THE ENVIRONMENT



"Nothing...other people do my work," said junior **Dave Atkins**.


"It's anarchy! Laura pulls her hair out and we all laugh at her," commented junior Matt Ellsworth.
